

LONDONDERRY TOWN COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

March 15, 2021

The meeting took place in the Moose Hill Council Chambers, 268B Mammoth Rd, Londonderry, NH 03053.

Present: Chairman John Farrell; Vice Chairman Joe Green; Councilor Tom Dolan, Deb Paul, and Jim Butler; Town Manager Kevin Smith; Assistant Town Manager Lisa Drabik; Executive Assistant Kirby Brown;

CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Farrell called the Town Council meeting to order. This was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. This was followed by a moment of silence for the Naar family, a local family who witnessed a tragic accident over the weekend. A moment of silence for Londonderry resident Kent Allen, and for Nick Codner, Building Inspectors, daughter who passed away.

The Council did the election of officers. Motion to appoint John Farrell as Chairman made by Councilor Butler and second by Vice Chairman Green. Chair votes 4-0-0. Councilor Paul did not vote.

Motion to appoint Joe Green as Vice Chairman made by Chairman Farrell and second by Councilor Butler. Chair votes 4-0-0. Councilor Paul did not vote.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no public comment.

PUBLIC HEARING

Motion to open public hearing made by Vice Chairman Green and second by Councilor Dolan. Chair votes 5-0-0.

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Chairman Farrell introduced Resolution #2021-06, the acceptance of unanticipated revenue under RSA 31:95-b, the reimbursement from state for vaccination site costs. Finance Director Justin Campo presented. Campo stated that this is for the first responders to be up at exit 4A. Instead of the town paying, the state will reimburse the town. Motion to approve Resolution #2021-06 made by Vice Chairman Green and second by Councilor Dolan. Chair votes 5-0-0.

Chairman Farrell introduced Resolution #2021-07, the acceptance of unanticipated revenue under RSA 31:95-b, assistance to firefighter's supplemental grant. Campo stated that the town applied for this at the beginning, and it was rejected. A second round was put forth and the town was awarded it. Motion to approve Resolution #2021-07 made by Vice Chairman Green and second by Councilor Butler. Chair votes 5-0-0.

Chairman Farrell introduced Resolution #2021-05, a Resolution relative to expansion of the Londonderry Housing and Redevelopment Authority. Town Manager Kevin Smith presented. This Resolution expands LHRA to the entire town. They are focused on economic development. Motion to approve Order #2021-05 made by Vice Chairman Green and second by Councilor Butler. Chair votes 5-0-0.

Motion to close public hearing made by Vice Chairman Green and second by Councilor Butler. Chair votes 5-0-0.

NEW BUSINESS

Police Chief Bill Hart and Police Captain Patrick Cheetham presented to the Council how the department might move forward with the body worn cameras, which has been brought to the Council's attention before. See the attached PowerPoint. Chief Hart stated that they are looking for the Council's approval to move forward. Chief Hart discussed the cost. Councilor Dolan motioned to move forward entering into negotiations and contract for the police body cameras with Body Worn, second by Vice Chairman Green. Chair votes 5-0-0.

Bart Fromuth, Freedom Energy, gave an update on the community aggregation plan. The plan was originally to vote on the plan. Fromuth gave an update on where things stand with

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Eversource. Fromuth stated that the law is subject to change. Fromuth stated that instead of approving the plan tonight, run the risk that there may be some change between now and when they are going to bring it in front of the PUC, they don't want to have to come back if there is a change. Fromuth said they will wait for approval from the PUC and come to the Council after for final approval. The Council agreed.

Chairman Farrell introduced Order #2021-07, an Order relative to the expenditure of Maintenance Trust Fund for various projects. Town Manager Smith presented and stated that this is for winter maintenance. Motion to approve made by Vice Chairman Green and second by Councilor Dolan. Chair votes 5-0-0.

Chairman Farrell introduced Order #2021-08, an Order relative to the distribution of Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Funds. Finance Director Justin Campo presented. Campo stated that this is for the match for the AFG Grant that was accepted with Resolution #2020-13. Motion to approve Order #2021-08 made by Councilor Dolan and second by Vice Chairman Green. Chair votes 5-0-0.

Town Manager Smith recommended to appoint Nick Codner as the Chief Building Inspector and John Trottier as the Public Works Director. Motion to appoint Codner and Trottier made by Councilor Butler. The Council endorsed both.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion to approve the Town Council minutes from March 1, 2021 made by Councilor Dolan and second by Councilor Butler. Chair votes 5-0-0.

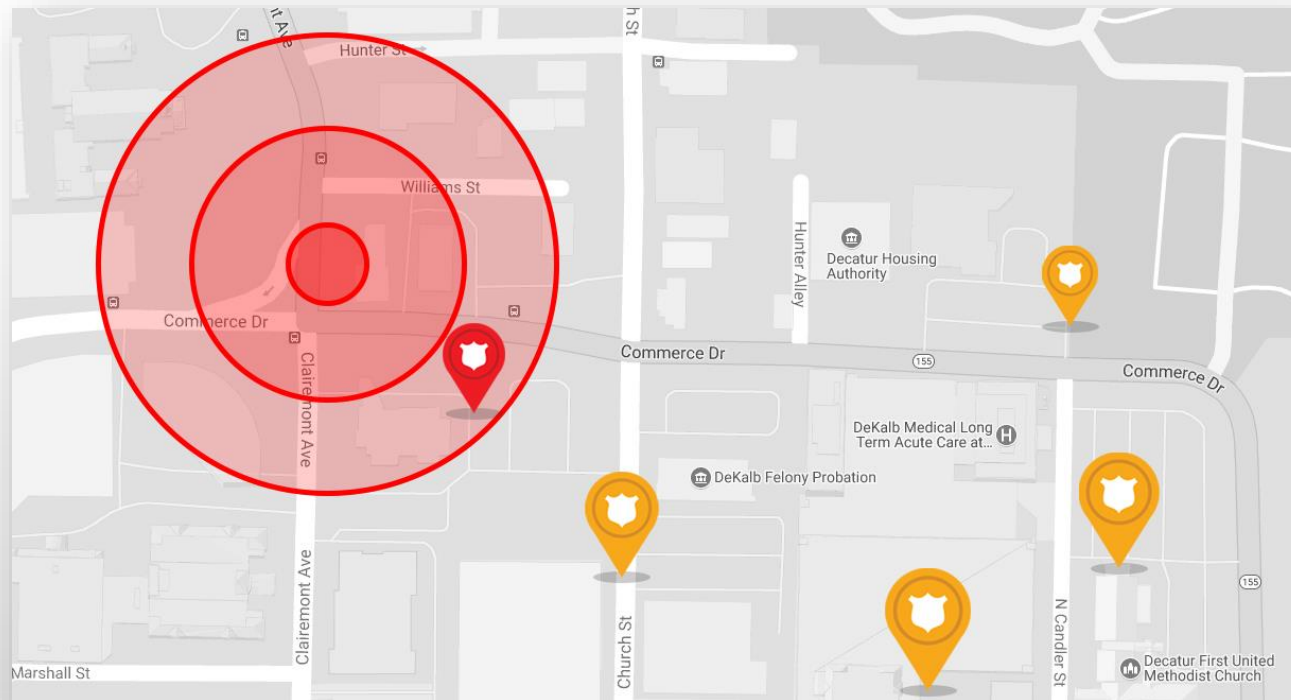
