7	Present: Chairman John Farrell; Councilor Jim Butler, Chad Franz, and Deb Paul; Town			
8 9	Manager Michael Malaguti; Finance Director Justin Campo; Absent: Executive Assistant Kirby Brown and Vice Chairman Green

11	CALL TO ORDER			
12				
13	Chairman Farrell called the Town Council meeting to order at 7:00 PM. This was followed			
14	by the Pledge of Allegiance. This was followed by a moment of silence for all of those who			
15	serves us here in Londonderry, all of our first responders who do a great job keeping us			
16	safe.

18	PUBLIC COMMENT			
19				
20	Chairman Farrell stated that there was a non-public prior to the meeting and the minutes			
21	have been sealed.			
22				
23	Kristine Perez, 5 Wesley Drive, stated that her name begins with a K and not a Ch. She			
24	would like it changed in the minutes.			
25				
26	Jonathan Esposito, 5 Shelley Drive, asked the Council about the closed session and stated			
27	that he plans on seeking third party review of the exemptions that the Council and School			
28	Board use a lot.			
29				
30	Racheal Killian, 6 Bridle Path, stated that she was curious about a recent event that took			
31 32	place and was highly publicized. Killian stated that she was wondering if other complaints were received and if there are any that were not publicly addresses. Chairman Farrell stated			

33 that it will all be addressed in the OHD debrief. Killian also asked if the Chairman and

34 Council were aware of the recent events involving one of the Councilors being arrested.

35 Chairman Farrell stated that it is a private matter+ and the Council knew nothing in advance.

36 Killian also asked the Council when they met to decide to release the press release that was

- 37 put out.

Maria Barut, 6 Bridle Path, asked if during the debrief, the public can ask questions. Chairman Farrell stated that it wouldn't be open to public comment. Barut stated that the Council addressed the flag issue but no one addressed the violent screaming from the proabortion group. They were screaming crazy things and Barut stated that she had to explain to her seven-year-old what abortion is. Barut stated that she would like the Council to

- 44 address this. Barut asked who approved the group.

LPD Deputy Chief Kim Bernard brought the Council up-to-date with some milestones
happening at the PD. Chief Bernard stated that on August 5th, Chief Hart retired. There are
also two, twenty-year employees; Captain Patrick Cheetham and Srgt. Scott Balukonis.
Chief Bernard also stated that Dispatcher Amelia McKeever resigned due to the fact that
she's moving. Chief Bernard thanked McKeever for all of her hard work and dedication to

53 Kristine Perez, 5 Wesley Drive, stated that she was flabbergasted and deeply offended from

- 54 the group. It was horrible what went on and it continued down at Mack's Apples.

56 Tom Estey, 9 Old Nashua Rd, stated that during the parade, with the flag, people from Kevin

57 Smith's campaign took pictures of that jeep and there were only two registered vehicles for

the parade, his and Don Bolducs. Estey stated how the jeep got in there and no one addressed

59 it. Este asked who was responsible for the parade and if it was Kirby. Chairman Farrell

stated that she was not responsible. Estey stated that everyone is here tonight for answers.
Estey stated that he saw Chairman Farrell pass by the area multiple times. Chairman Farrell

62 stated that he never saw it. Estey stated that Kevin Smith's campaign took pictures and saw

63 the flag.

71 Town Manager Michael Malaguti gave an Old Home Day debrief. Malaguti addressed complaints and presented a PowerPoint to the Council and public. See attached. Malaguti 72 stated that the town received complaints from five citizens about the pro-abortion people, 73 three citizens who felt that the town should have taken more stance against the flag, two 74 citizens who felt that Londonderry C.A.R.E.S. booth on the Common should have not been 75 there because of that groups support of LGBTQ youth, and two citizens who complained 76 about the statement from the Council condemning the flag. Malaguti stated that the town 77 78 heard from four to five people regarding safety issues, and vehicle and traffic issues.

79

Town Manager Malaguti went over the process of parade registration and how it's put 80 together. It's a small group made up of town staff and a few volunteers. Malaguti stated that 81 there were only two to three people who were directing the whole thing on the day. Sixty-82 two separate groups were there. Malaguti stated that in order to register, you fill out a form. 83 The form is sent back to Kirby Brown. Kirby then organizes them and sends them to Steve 84 Dente. Not a single applicant was turned away and the town has never turned anyone away. 85 We also let in late participants. The Rotary offers volunteers to help down at the parade 86 lineup. Malaguti stated that he drafted the parade script and he only edited them due to 87

- 88 length. Malaguti shared the forms of the groups that the town received complaints about.

Malaguti went over the rules and laws of what the town can say yes and no to. Malaguti stated that Londonderry stood on the right side of the First Amendment, even when it's uncomfortable to.

94 Councilor Paul asked if we can limit the amount of people in the parade.

95

Ann Chiampa, 28 Wedgewood Drive, stated that this should be an old-fashioned type of day and its been blown out of proportion. Chiampa stated that we need to restrain it to the meaning of the day. Chiampa stated that it turned into a circus.

99

Racheal Killian, 6 Bridle Path, thanked Malaguti for all of his research. Killian stated that
 the memo that went out, didn't seem impartial. Killian stated that the vehicle wasn't apart

102 of anyone's campaign. Killian stated that jeep was rebuilt by a resident who was recreating

103 it to be a replica of that era. A member of the audience corrected Killian and stated he's

from Pelham. Chairman Farrell stated that he wished the candidate would have come to the meeting and the Council would have accepted his explanation. Killian stated that that is not something that candidate would have supported had it come to his attention.

107

Jonathan Esposito, 5 Shelley Drive, stated that there were two safety concerns. Esposito 108 stated that his wife called the Police Department regarding a safety issue at Moose Hill at 109 approximately 10:40 the morning of OHD. Esposito stated that the dispatcher for the PD 110 apparently didn't log it. When SRO Perry arrived, he had not received a communication 111 from the PD. Esposito stated that two elected officials apparently thought the touch-a-truck 112 113 area was a private parking lot and decided to drag a cone halfway across it. Esposito stated that he still hasn't heard an explanation from the town on it. Esposito stated that Sunday 114 evening he emailed Town Manager Malaguti about another safety issue in which he and his 115 children were within another elected officials' vehicles when they pulled out from the 116 parade. 117

Chairman Farrell asked Malaguti if an email complaint was received. Malaguti stated it was 119 and it was passed along to the PD. Esposito stated that along with that his wife called the 120 PD that morning and Esposito claimed the call wasn't logged and it was never relayed to 121 SRO Perry that there was an elected official who was dragging a cone across the parking 122 lot. Deputy Chief Bernard stated that he did receive an email from Esposito and he did 123 promptly respond to his email. Chief Bernard stated that he checked the police log and there 124 was not a call logger, not to say she didn't call, and not to say that the dispatcher was busy 125 with everything's and forgot to enter a parking lot complaint. Chief Bernard stated that PD 126 had a busy day that day, he received the call log and emailed him back immediately. 127 Chairman Farrell asked where the second incident took place. Esposito stated the 128 Londonderry Middle School parking lot. The staging area. Esposito stated that this person 129 took off to get into line in an inappropriate manner. Malaguti stated that he also responded 130 to Esposito's email as well. Chief Bernard stated that two officers were present at the 131 beginning on the parade and no report was made to either of the officers who were stationed 132 at that location. Chairman Farrell let Esposito know that we can try to do better going 133 134 forward.

135

136 Kristine Perez, 5 Wesley Drive, stated that she witnessed the incident at the Middle School.

137 Perez stated that she finds it suspicious that the people taking picture of the flag that day

138 were connected with another campaign and a campaign that Chairman Farrell is very

involved with. Chairman Farrell stated that no accusations should be made and he does not

140 participate in Mr. Smith's campaign and he will not sit there and listen to accusations. Perez

141 stated that she finds it suspicious that something came out about the flag and not the other 142 issues.

143

Martha Smith, 38 Shasta Drive, stated that OHD has been a long-standing tradition in all of the New Hampshire towns to celebrate the history of the town. Smith asked if there was a difference between inviting a politician in the parade and political issues being addressed in a parade. Chairman Farrell stated that we only invite politicians at the National level. Malaguti stated all the others find us. Malaguti stated that because of free speech, if you let one in, you have to let the other in.

- 151 Councilor butler stated that going forward we need to tighten it up and he suggested that the 152 people filing these complaints should get involved.

- 154 Councilor Paul stated that OHD should be all volunteers and the town shouldn't be involved 155 and everyone in the room should step up.

- Ray Breslin, 3 Gary Drive, stated that a lot of statements have been made and we havelearned how people can step up going forward.

- Ted Combes, 6 Bancroft Road, stated that if we start eliminating groups, we will get in a lotof legal trouble.

- 163 Jake Butler, 2 Danbury Ct, stated that this was a great OHD. Butler stated that politics has 164 become ugly and it's sad that it overshadowed the whole event. Butler thanked the OHD
- 165 committee for everything they did.

- 167 Janet Hutala, 5 Stony Point Drive, stated that when she arrived only the parade director 168 knew what was going on. Hutala stated Steve was doing a great job. Hutala stated things 169 could be done better but we shouldn't be blaming it on the organizations.

- 171 Mike Pettengill, 5 Apollo Road Ext., thanked Malaguti for the presentation and stated that 172 all groups should work together and you open a can of worms when you start to say no to
- 173 some groups and not to others.

Parade - First Amendment

Government speech

- Government may speak for itself.
- First Amendment does not apply.
- Requires "effective control" over the message being conveyed. *Pleasant Grove City v. Summum*, 55 U.S. 460 (2009).
- Example: Londonderry's annual 9/11 observances or a veterans' parade

Forum for private speech

- "The First Amendment means that government has no power to restrict expression because of its message, its ideas, its subject matter, or its content." *Police Dep't of Chicago v. Mosley*, 408 U.S. 92 (1972).
- Exceptions: obscenity, child pornography, true threats, incitement to imminent lawless action
- Example: Flag pole at Boston City Hall Plaza or public comment at a Town Council meeting



Limited or Dedicated Public Forum

- Government entity may create a forum that is limited to use by certain groups or dedicated solely to the discussion of certain subjects.
- Examples:
 - Leake v. Drinkard, 14 F.4th 1242 (11th Cir. 2021)
 - Good News Club v. Milford Central School, 553 U.S. 98 (2001)
- Restrictions must be reasonable and viewpoint neutral

Persecution for the expression of opinions seems to me perfectly logical. If you have no doubt of your premises or your power, and want a certain result with all your heart, you naturally express your wishes in law, and sweep away all opposition. To allow opposition by speech seems to indicate that you think the speech impotent, as when a man says that he has squared the circle, or that you do not care wholeheartedly for the result, or that you doubt either your power or your premises. But when men have realized that time has upset many fighting faiths, they may come to believe even more than they believe the very foundations of their own conduct that *the ultimate good desired is better reached by free trade in ideas -- that the best test of truth is the power of the thought to get itself accepted in the competition of the market*, and that truth is the only ground upon which their wishes safely can be carried out. *That, at any rate, is the theory of our Constitution*.
